## Meet the Governors

The Governors at The Blake School have three main roles...

1. Ensuring clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction;
2. Holding the headteacher to account for the educational performance of the school and its pupils, and the performance management of staff;
3. Overseeing the financial performance of the school and making sure its money is well spent.

As part of the Oxford Diocesan Schools Trust (ODST) the work of the Governing Board is supported by the Directors of ODST.

During the year the governors send out monthly newsletters and termly business summaries. Please look out for these as they will inform you of school improvement priorities and the work of the governing board.



Elizabeth is the Chair of the Governors; she is a Foundation Governor, appointed by the Directors of ODST on the recommendation of the PCC at St Mary's, Cogges.

Elizabeth has been a governor for seven years and wherever possible attends all committee meetings.

Elizabeth is a familiar face around the school and meets regularly with Mr Edwards-Grundy to keep up to date with school matters and to provide a confidential sounding board.

Philip is a parent governor, elected by the parent community at The Blake School.

Philip is Vice Chair of the Governors. Philip Chairs the Strategy and Finance committee and is a member of the Curriculum committee, he has a particular interest in finance and data. Philip's two children attend the school.

Governors attend school events and also circulate an annual survey in order to ensure that they hear the views of the wider school community.



As headteacher at The Blake School Mr Edwards-Grundy is automatically a governor.

Mr Edwards-Grundy provides regular written reports to governors and attends meetings to provide both verbal reports and answer governor questions.

Fiona is a staff governor, elected by the other members of the school staff. Fiona has been a teacher at The Blake School for thirteen years and has particular responsibility for music through the school.

Fiona is a member of the Property, Pastoral and Community sub-committee.



David is a foundation governor; he is also a member of The Blake Educational Trust, which supports the school by providing some external funding.

David is currently the longest serving governor having been in post for over twenty years.

David is a member of the Strategy and Finance committee.

Stuart is a foundation governor, appointed by the Directors of ODST on the recommendation of the PCC at St Mary's, Cogges.

Stuart is a member of the Curriculum committee; his two children attend the School.




Sam is a parent governor, elected during the past academic year by the parent community at The Blake School.

Sam is Chair of the Pastoral, Premises and Community committee.


Simon is a foundation governor appointed by the Directors of ODST; he is also the vicar of St Mary's Cogges and St James the Great South Leigh.

Simon is a familiar face around the school and regularly leads collective worship.



Ernie is a foundation governor, appointed during the past academic year by the Directors of ODST on the recommendation of the PCC at St Mary's, Cogges.

Ernie is a member of the Strategy and Finance and Curriculum committees and has a particular interest in data.



Anthony is a foundation governor, appointed by the Directors of ODST on the recommendation of the PCC at St Mary's, Cogges.

Anthony is the safeguarding governor, he is a member of the Pastoral, Premises and Community committee; his three children all attend the school.

Barbara is a foundation governor, appointed by the Directors of ODST on the recommendation of the PCC at St Mary's, Cogges.

Barbara was a secondary school teacher for most of her working life; she is the Chair of the Curriculum committee.



As deputy headteacher at The Blake School Mrs Doland has a standing invitation to attend any meeting of the governing board.

Mrs Doland, alongside Mr Edwards-Grundy, brings reports and data to the governing board; she works closely with the Curriculum committee.

In order to work efficiently and effectively the governing board at The Blake School needs people with a wide range of knowledge, experience and expertise. The current board is made up of governors who bring expertise from business, education, finance and safeguarding and have skills that together make them well placed to fulfil their three key roles. When there are vacancies for parent governors the parent body is advised of these.

The full governing board meets five times a year. All governors are also members of one of the sub-committees, which meet at least termly. Information about the work of the governing board is shared with parents/carers via the termly summary of business documents.
