Peregrine falcons are nesting at the top of Salisbury Cathedral. The peregrines are so popular they even have their own You Tube channel and blog. You can also watch the Peregrine nest live, where the female laid eggs on Mothering Sunday.

Staying up to date with news

It can be hard to know what news to share with your children at this time.

If your child is in Key Stage 2 they might enjoy reading 'First News'. This weekly newspaper is produced specifically for children aged between 8 and 12 and contains a range of articles and information about a whole range of news. It also includes some puzzles that you can enjoy as a family.

First News is usually only available by subscription but whilst schools are closed it will be made available free online. You will be able to access future editions on their website.

Remember in this time of uncertainty to limit the amount of news that you listen to and make time to listen to each other and share your concerns. Helping your children to talk about the things they worry about is an important part of them learning to manage their concerns in a healthy way.
