News from Mr Edwards-Grundy

'Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonour others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil, but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.'

So famously writes the apostle Paul in the Bible (1 Corinthians 13); it is a passage often read at weddings in church. This week, we have had it written on our staff room board, a reminder every time you go and make a cup of tea, of what love is all about. These are challenging words! As the week has gone on, I've left longer between cups of tea so that I don't have to be reminded of them so often!

As I wrote last week, love is a decision we make. There are wonderful times when love comes with emotion, a warm and fuzzy feeling, it makes us laugh and feel joy. However, there are times when love is hard work and the determination to stick by the right decision.

More often than not however, love is an act of will. As I stand waiting for my tea to brew I am so often floored by those first three words, love is patient. As a school, we of course explore Patience as a Value separately and we challenge one another to be patient with ourselves and with one another. But as we consider Love as the Value for this month, I am struck that to love someone is to be patient with them.

As I look around our school community I am aware of the raft of different challenges that children and adults alike are dealing with. It is not for each of us to know all the circumstances of one another's lives, but in living as community we should demonstrate our love for one another by being patient, even without knowing the challenges the other faces.

The Year 6 children are currently reading 'Wonder'. Within the book is a thought-provoking statement:

'When given the choice between being right and being kind, choose kind.'

Love is kind. All our values are intertwined, to love is to be patient, to be patient is to be kind and to love. There will be many occasions that each of us faces, on a day-to-day basis, when we must choose to love, choose to be patient and choose to be kind, even when we may well feel anything but!

The words on our staff room noticeboard will be wiped off this weekend and next week something else will be written there, but for me, the challenge of those first six words will remain. 'Love is patient, love is kind.' Maybe when we next explore Love together as our Value in February 2024, I will be ready to face the challenges of the rest of the verses!

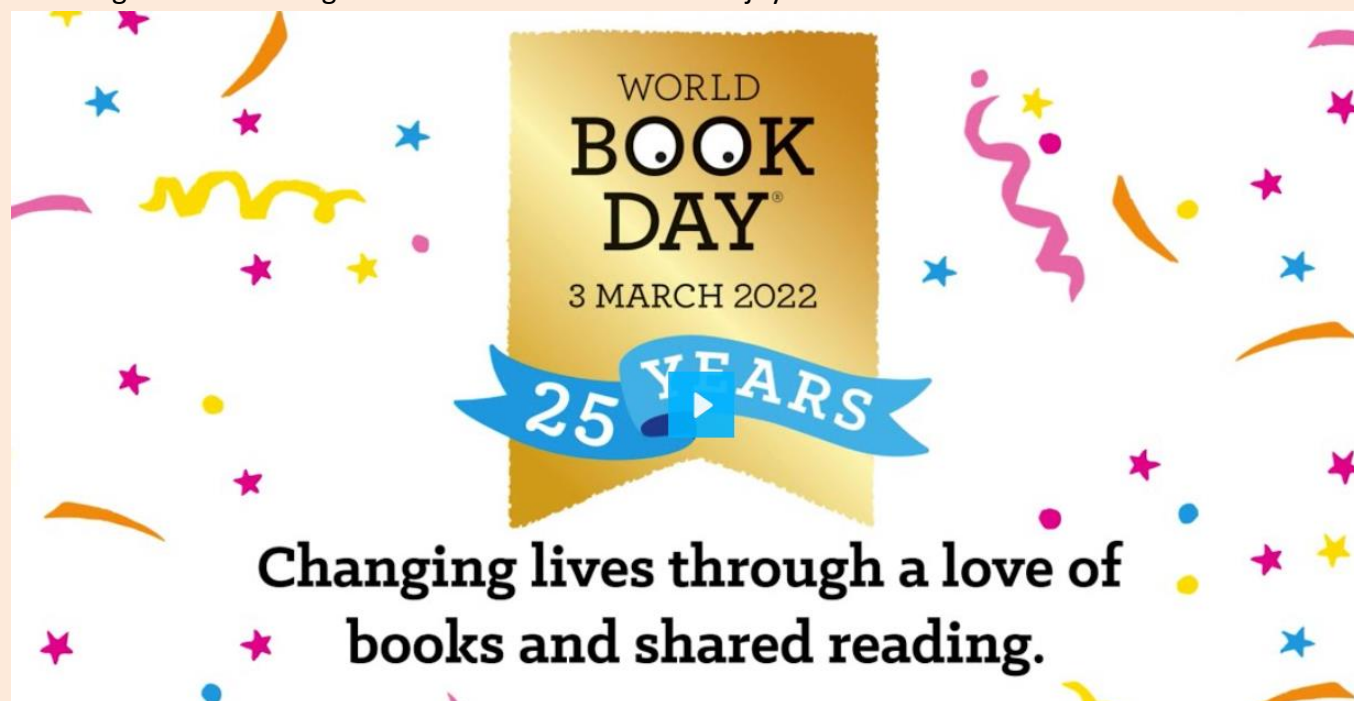
Book week – Monday 28th February to Friday 4th March

This year, World Book Day is on Thursday 3rd March.

On that day we will be encouraging children to come into school dressed as their favourite character from a book. Do encourage your children to think about the stories they love and to come dressed to celebrate their favourite character.

In school, we will also be running a competition to see if children can guess which teacher is hiding behind the book, and teachers will be dropping into one another's classrooms to read a story.

Our eco-council is also leading us through a new initiative to recycle books. Children will be asked to bring into school a book in good condition that they have enjoyed but no longer want, and they will then be given a token to 'spend' later in the week on a new book that they would like to take home instead.
