This week, in Collective Worship, as we continued to think about Compassion, we thought about how Compassion can help us to love our enemies.

Very often our enemies are people we do not understand, or people whose behaviour can cause us to be afraid. Compassion helps us to understand one another, it gives time to understanding the viewpoint of someone else and it can therefore dispel fear.

Together in Collective Worship we thought particularly about how Compassion can help us to re-pay evil with good, it was a discussion that challenged every one of us. As I shared with the staff team today, the decision to do good where we have been wronged is not an easy one. However, such difficult decisions transform communities and ultimately, we will all benefit as we each show Compassion to one another, perhaps especially where we are least deserving of it.

As I walk around this school, I see Compassion in a myriad of small ways, in each classroom. Adults model Compassion for your children and they in turn choose to show Compassion to one another. Compassion builds community as it helps us to understand one another and to appreciate the different challenges that others face.

This week I have been very moved to see the growing pile of shoeboxes as you and your children fill them with not just lovely toys, but also so many basics that we take for granted. These boxes will transform Christmas for children who would otherwise not receive anything and whose daily lives lack even the simplest of resources. The filling of shoeboxes, perhaps more so this year than many others, as each of us begins to feel the financial squeeze, is a clear outworking of Compassion. It is a recognition of what it must be like to have so little and then to respond to that need.

I want to thank each of you who filled or part-filled a box, for demonstrating Compassion to those who you will never meet and whose lives are very different to your own. Whilst your generosity will mean that children have warm gloves, or pencils with which to colour, it will also send a message of love. Your shoebox will say to each and every recipient, that someone has taken the time to understand what it must be like to be them, and to do something about it. Your gift is Compassion in action, and it will change lives this Christmas.
