This week we have moved to our new Value of the Month, Patience.

This morning in Collective Worship we started to think about waiting and about what patience means. The children reflected on times they have had to be patient and what it is like to have to wait for something. I especially enjoyed the number of children who have to wait whilst they clean bedrooms or do another job around the house before getting the reward of television or game time!

Together we thought about whether waiting is good or bad and whilst we concluded that it is often hard, we all agreed that waiting can be a good thing. Waiting can change us, often in ways that we do not expect. Our Bible reading from Romans 5 helped us think about the things that waiting can grow in us, including perseverance.

Your children thought carefully about other things that waiting and being patient can develop in them. As I walk around the school and see your children learning, interacting with their peers and working with their teachers I often see not just patience in action, but also some of the other things that waiting can produce.

We are not always good at being patient, it can be a hard thing to develop, but I think there is real value in the waiting.

As adults we are aware of how quickly time passes, but we can nonetheless be as impatient as our children to reach the next thing, achieve the next goal, get to the thing we really want to do, but patience is all about slowing down. Patience is the challenge to accept all the things that happen in the waiting, to allow ourselves to be changed.

As you know, we opened our new Adventure Zone in September and soon afterwards we put up some slack lines. Every day since they were put up, Beatrice has been practising walking along them. Day after
