Sometimes we all face challenges. These challenges may relate to circumstances, relationships, health or learning. To trust yourself can however be hard and that is where being part of community is so important. Community can give us hope when we feel hopeless, courage when we are afraid, inspiration when we are defeated and encouragement when the journey is long.

Learning to trust others does not always come easily to us though, we can prefer to hide away, stuck in what we know. It is my experience however that trust is almost always worth the risk, it takes us to new places, offers us new opportunities and gives us someone to travel with.

In school we are often encouraging your children to stretch their trust, to trust themselves in taking new and unfamiliar steps and to trust others to help them along the way.

On the staffroom notice-board this week has been a quote from Corrie Ten Boom, who was imprisoned in an internment camp during World War Two.

"Never be afraid to trust an unknown future to a known God"

Like Corrie, I have found this to be true, over and over again. I do not know what lies ahead, but travelling with a community around me and secure in the knowledge that God knows and holds the future in his hands, I have courage to try new things, make brave decisions and face them all with hope.

This weekend I encourage you to, like your children, take a risk and stretch your trust, you never know where it may lead you.
