Although it is not December until the middle of next week, in the Church's calendar, Advent begins this coming weekend. Advent is a traditional time of waiting and preparing. As children open their Advent calendars, they are of course waiting for Christmas, counting down the days until the 25th. However, this year, for us as adults, it is also very much a season of waiting – perhaps a wait even more eager than that of our children as they wait for Christmas!

In this continuing time of uncertainty, we too are waiting; for a vaccine, for changes to restrictions, for the world to go 'back to normal', for it to be different. As waiting for Christmas is a challenge for our children, so the current waiting is difficult for us too and we are not always patient!
