News from Mrs Patchett

Prior to the half-term break, I sent out a questionnaire to all the parents of children who have special or additional needs.

The aim of the questionnaire was to help me reflect on the provision that we currently have in place, where we can improve it and where we are already getting it right.

I am very grateful to all those who completed the questionnaire, particularly where you took the time to leave additional comments.

80% of parents who responded said that there are adequate formal and informal opportunities to speak to members of staff who know their children. There were some helpful suggestions about how communication could be improved that we will be exploring.

90% of parents who responded said that they felt able to raise any concerns with school staff. We recognise that drop off and pick up times are busy and so conversations where concerns need to be discussed need to be planned.

97% of parents who responded said that their views about their child are listened and responded to.

97% of parents who responded said that their child's views are listened and responded to.


Mid-year IEP reviews are taking place during Parents' evenings before the end of term
